PREMATURE BURIAL.

To the Editor of the "British Journal of Nursing." Dear Madam,—Perhaps you know that a new, scientific method of preventing premature burial was recently brought to the notice of the French Academy of Science. It is reported that M. Vaillant, director of the Radiographic Laboratory at the Lariboisière Hospital in Paris, has, since 1897, made experiments with over 1,000 subjects, living and dead, and has arrived at the discovery that by means of the X-rays it is possible to prevent premature burial.

Two radiographs, one of a living person, the other of a corpse, were exhibited. In the radiograph of the living person it was impossible to distinguish the internal organs, while in that of the corpse the liver, etc., were clearly visible.
