## The Irish Murses' Association.

The Annual General Meeting of the Irish Nurses Association, happily fixed for St. Patrick's Day, was held on Tuesday evening, at 86, Lower Leeson Street, Dublin, when Mrs. Kildare Treacy, the out-going President, whose year of office has been so fruitful in work for the good, both of the I.N.A., whose welfare she has closely at heart, and also for the profession at large, delivered an interesting address to a large and interested audience. She said in part:

THE OUTGOING PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS. "The Association is to be congratulated upon an increase of 76 members during the past year. We may thus conclude that our Irish Nurses' Association is firmly fixed upon ground favourable to its growth, and has afforded ample reasons for its existence, as a centre for union and discussion, for educational purposes, and for the protection and defence of nursing interests. we realise almost daily how necessary it is to have such organisation and machinery at our disposal in these days, when nursing politics are pressing, and the greater number of such questions as arise must be dealt with at once. "The Matrons' Association takes a pro-

minent part, undertaking weighty and valuable work in the interests of both Associations, and we would emphasise the growth of influence

arising from this concerted action."
Mrs. Treacy then referred to the keen appreciation shown of the valuable lectures kindly delivered from time to time by medical practitioners, to the useful work of the Library Committee, to the valuable services of Miss L. V.
