house in March. Meanwhile the children had to be put somewhere, and she went to Green's Farm, which proved inadequate. The doctor was called in continually, and there was no neglect.

The jury, being so directed, found the prisoner not guilty, and she was discharged.

We hope that if Miss Wills continues to take in children she will not pose as a nurse, but will engage one thoroughly qualified to attend to the health of the children, and to keep them clean and free from vermin.
