THE BADGE—THE ROSE, THISTLE, AND SHAM-ROCK.

All members of Nurses' Societies affiliated. through a National Council to the International. Council will have the right to wear the Members' Congress Badge. It was decided that it should be a rosette composed of rose, mauve, and green satin ribbon, to signify the national flowers of England, Scotland, and Ireland—therose, the thistle, and the shamrock. This will not prevent nurses wearing a national badge as well. Canadian nurses suggest wearing a maple leaf, a badge by which they will bereadily recognised.
