All these delegates are Registered Nurses under the Act for the State Examination of Nurses in the German Empire, passed in 1906, and can speak English well. Sister Karll is interesting herself in material for the Exhibition. She writes: "Some beautiful dolls have arrived, amongst them a sweet little Franciscan nun. I think our baby exhibit will be nice; it comes from the Matron of the Gisela Children's Hospital in Munich, Sister Martha von Studeradt. Germany is evidently going to be well to the fore at the Congress.

THE DELEGATION FROM SWEDEN.

From Stockholm comes the official information that a Committee has been formed of representatives of all the chief Nursing Institutions under the patronage of the Queen Dowager Sophia, whose life-long personal interest in the care of the sick is so well known.

A delegation of about thirty Swedish nurses will attend the Congress, and rank as fraternal delegates, as the organisation will hardly be completed in time to apply for affiliation with the International Council in July. We need not add that the heartiest welcome awaits the Swedish nurses from our National Council.

THE DELEGATION FROM JAPAN.

The following letter has been received from Japan in reply to Miss Dock's letter of invitation, that Japanese nurses should take part in the Congress:—

DEAR MADAM,-We are in receipt of your favour of the 1st ult., regarding the International Council of Nurses to be held in London from the 19th to the 23rd of July, to which you have so kindly extended your invitation to our nurses, or to the nursing body of Japan. We are very much interested in your undertaking, as, we have no doubt, it is of great benefit to humane work, and would be a good opportunity on the part of our nurses to learn more about far advanced nursing systems in Europe and America, as well as to get in touch with nurses of the West. Please note that we have so arranged as to delegate to the said Congress one Head Nurse and a member of the Ladies' Volunteer Nursing Association of the Red Cross Society of Japan, the former representing the whole Red Cross Nursing hody, and the latter the said Asso-ciation respectively.
