This issue of League News, the Bart's League journal, is very substantial, and is quite a Congress number.



The Committee of St. Bartholomew's Hospital have set an example to their fellow governors connected with big hospitals. The certificated nurses, after four years' training and ser-

vice, may affiliate themselves to the Private Nursing Department on a just co-operative arrangement. The nurses take their own fees, and pay the usual 7½ per cent., and when duty off lodged, boarded, and served for a very small sum weekly. Thus the nurses can still remain connected with the hospital, and no attempt is made to exploit their work for profit. The medical staff can also procure nurses trained in their own methods in their own wards as so many doctors prefer to do.

We commend this matter to the earnest consideration of the Committees of hospitals running private nursing departments, especially to that of the London Hospital.
