LONDON MISSIONARY SCHOOL OF MEDICINE EXHIBIT. A beautiful set of model cots, illustrating the treatment of various diseases, carried out by Sister Marian Rumball, now the property of the London Missionary School of Medicine, are kindly lent by the Committee through the kind offices of the Hon. Secretary, Dr. E. A. Neatby. Everyone should make a point of seeing this exhibit, which will be on view in Ante-Room, No. 1, together with the School Nursing Exhibit, in charge of Miss H. L. Pearse, Superintendent of School Nurses under the London County Council, and of the School Nurses' League.

THE MORTUARY EXHIBIT.

This is being arranged by Miss Greenstreet, for so many years Sister Mark, at St. Bartholomew's Hospital. Some beautiful examples of palls, mortuary-linen, etc., will be on view here, and those interested in the reverent care of the dead should not fail to pay a visit to this Section.

THE DISTRICT NURSING SECTION.

The organisation of this important Section is in the hands of Lady Hermione Blackwood, Queen's Nurse; Miss C. C. du Sautoy, County Superintendent for Somerset, Q.V.J.I.; and Miss E. L. C. Eden, Central Organiser, Nurses' Social Union, who have spared no pains to make it complete.

The frieze in this room, which has been painted by Miss Platt, should be specially noted. lines of the design are made by a bandage, showing a reef knot, clove hitch, spica, etc. The bandage is dropped by an old gamp, and the other end is taken and applied by Queen's Nurses, who are shown attending to childhood, youth, and age.

Amongst the exhibitors in this section are the staff of Carnforth Lodge, Hammersmith, the Ranyard Nurses, Miss Loane, Miss Hadden, Miss E. L. C. Eden, the Nurses' Bedford Hospital Guild, Social Union, the Miss Vaughan, of Westminster District Nursing Association, Miss Cowper, Superintendent, Scottish Branch, Q.V.J.I., the Midwives' Institute; Miss Hitchcock, of the Nurses' Settlement, New York; Miss Elston, Bordeaux; Miss Tilanus, Amsterdam; and from Cuba Miss Hibbard is bringing a Cuban baby's layette, and other exhibits.
