Nursing Echoes.



Miss M. H. Sherlock, Matron of Addenbrooke's Home of Recovery, Hunstanton, writes:—People about here are interested in Red Cross work, and last Friday I had to take over part of my detachment to take part in a display at Thornham. We had to prepare an Emergency Hospital, and in the midst of

our work while the "sick and wounded" Territorials were being brought in, we were honoured by a visit from Queen Alexandra, the Dowager Empress of Russia, and Princess Victoria. They came round the wards, and spoke to many of the nurses and patients, to whom their visit gave unqualified pleasure.

Nurses in hospitals in the United Kingdom can scarcely realise how important the daily supply of ice is, for it comes with unflinching regularity, and is one of the necessities of life. The regularity of the supply might, however, have been broken lately but that the men on strike at the London Docks evidently appreciate their responsibility to the public. The President of the National Transport Workers' Federation recently informed the representative of a contemporary that the strikers would do nothing to endanger the public health, and that special arrangements had been made for the supply of ice to hospitals.

Just now the desire of most people is to get out of London as the Bank Holiday exodus proved. Nurses especially who have been at work for the last twelve months are longing for the quiet of the country, and an open air life, and these can be obtained under ideal conditions at Broadlands, near Medstead, in Hampshire, which is the first nature-cure in this country, but where the open-air life and bracing air may also be enjoyed without treatment, if so desired.
