the London Hospital, St. Thomas's Hospital, and the Royal Infirmary, Edinburgh. The same year she also spent some time in Berlin as a private nurse.

In 1907 she resigned the very arduous position of Theatre Sister in the Sophia Home, and was appointed Sister in a medical ward in the large clinical Serafimer Hospital, one of the largest and most up-to-date hospitals in Sweden.

It will be readily understood, therefore, that Miss Lindhagen has had a most varied experience, and it is not surprising that when the Swedish Nurses' Association was founded last year she should have been elected its first President.

PRACTICAL POINTS.

To Save

Much time may be saved by putting patches of lint Mending Stockings. inside the parts of stockings that get most wear. A piece

about $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. by 3 in. across the toe, and another 3 in. square inside the heel should be darned on with a few big stitches in black cotton, and then herringboned all round. The patches last a considerable time, and are easily replaced when worn out.

For Painting the Throat.

It has been found that an ordinary glass hat-pin-head is an excellent subsitute for the obnoxious throat-brush, as it causes no irritation, and is

very easily cleansed. By twirling slowly back-wards and forwards in the fingers a sufficient quantity of the pigment can be retained on the head of the pin.

Intestinal Intoxication. The New York Medical Journal says: "In cases of collapse in infants after intestinal intoxication, Wurtz

recommends subcutaneous injections of camphor as being superior to saline infusion. All food is stopped for from twenty-four to seventy-two hours, and if collapse appears from 0.5 to 1 c.c. of a ten per cent. solution of camphor in olive oil injected, to be repeated every three hours if necessary."

In some military Glycerin and Potassium manœuvres, recently (says Permanganate Cause Fire. Medical Association), a bottle

of glycerin was broken and the glycerin ran over some packets of permanganate of potassium. These packets were covered with absorbent cotton, which took fire. Experiments show that chemical reaction takes place, with explosion and fire. It is, therefore, important to avoid packing glycerin and permanganate of potassium near each other in sanitary stores.
