The goods, including a bedstead, old trunks, and some water-colour sketches, were tastefully arranged on trestle tables round the lawn; each table was a special department. Just before three o'clock, there was considerable agitation outside the gates; the helpers were ready for a

The Sale realised over £10. Warm thanks are due to all those who sent parcels, and to Nurse Yonge, to whom the success of the Sale is due.

The Matron is starting a Roof Garden with half of the proceeds: there is a wonderful flat roof at the hospital, with a grand view over London. In the summer it is much used, both by nurses and patients: it will be still more appreciated when gay with flowers.

The balance is to buy new soil, make a rockery, and generally beautify the garden that now is. The little snap-shot shows some of the staff at work in it.

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
