from 5.50 a.m. to 5.50 p.m., after which the prison was in the hands of night patrols and watchmen, and the reserve guard. In convict prisons the officers worked in two divisions, their

time slightly overlapping.

In regard to an appeal to the Secretary of State, in the event of a dispute as to the superannuation allowance to which an officer or servant is entitled under the Act of 1909, the Law Officers of the Crown had advised that there was no appeal, either as to whether the aggrieved person was an established officer or what class he should be placed in. It certainly appears just that an appeal should be provided for in the case of an officer who feels aggrieved by the decision of the authorities of an asylum in these matters of vital importance to him, respecting pension and superannuation allowance.
