greatly on the position in life, but care should be taken to buy the best material in one's power, as, though the outlay may appear great, it will be the most economical in the end." Nothing can be more unsatisfactory, as not only the money spent, but the labour too, is almost thrown away on cheap and common calico. The supplying linen for an Institution is a difficult matter. It must be remembered it is public money that is given for charity that is to be laid out; and whilst still carrying out the above rules of good quality and great plenty, care must be especially taken that nothing is wasted. In selecting material it must not be forgotten that a low price is not cheap. In a Hospital the washing is constant, sometimes bad and by machinery; and unless it is of the best quality, it will speedily wear out. The frequent washing necessitates a much larger quantity per head. In private life it is different; where the linen is changed periodically, and the week's supply given out regularly, all this is altered. Fresh linen and frequent changes are absolutely necessary, where restoration to health is every one's sole study. I believe patients appreciate the luxury of cleanliness as highly as anything they receive at our hands; it is so strangely different to their usual surroundings, and imagine the comfort and cleanliness, the general cheerfulness of a Hospital ward, the freedom from home worries, combined with the regula diet, go further towards recovery than the Doctor's medicines.
