NURSING ECHOES.

The report of the Nightingale School for Nurses at St. Thomas Hospital endorses the experience of every other school which has instituted a course of preliminary training for probationers. It states that the preliminary training at the school is proving its value in weeding out unpromising pupils, the number of whom has steadily decreased in each of the last three years.
