SAN FRANCISCO, 1915.

First of all, the news that Miss L. L. Dock, the Hon. Secretary of the International Council of Nurses, is on the high seas, and will be in England in a few days, will be hailed with delight by her many friends on this side, who hold her in warmest affection.

Just before sailing, Miss Dock sent for publication the following information:—The meetings recently held in New York by the organizers of the forthcoming meeting of the International Council of Nurses, and of the Nursing Congress and Exhibition to be held during the great Panama-Pacific International Exposition in San Francisco in 1915, have agreed upon a preliminary programme.

The date of the Nursing Congress is set for May 31st to June 6th.

Sunday, May 30th, there will be an informal Reception of Delegates.

Monday, May 31st, is to be International Day, when the business sessions, including affiliation ceremonies, introduction of delegates, &c., take place.

June 1st, 2nd, and 3rd—Congress Days—the meetings of which will necessarily have to be held in sections, because of the great mass of subjects to treat.

EDUCATION DAY.

Wednesday, June 2nd, is to be Education Day, and it is to be held at Berkeley, the seat of the University of California, where there is a very beautiful outdoor theatre, after a Greek model. The proceedings will be held in this theatre, and a great feature will be made of the Gifts and Offerings to the Florence Nightingale Educational Memorial. Everything is to be most beautiful and impressive. Nurses will bring their gifts and lay them on a sort of altar in the central space. They can wear uniform, and will be asked to carry banners showing their Country, State, and Hospital. This ceremony is to be the American substitute for a pageant—which they do not think could be made so interesting, as they have no specially national historic background, as the European countries have, and they do not wish to imitate what has been so well done in England, Germany, and Ireland. The affiliated countries feel quite secure in leaving the staging of this unique ceremony to their American colleagues. It is sure to be fresh, vigorous, and inspiring.

Thursday, June 3rd.—A great International Banquet will be held on the evening of this day.

VALUABLE PRIZES AT SAN FRANCISCO.

Miss J. A. Delano, the Superintendent of Red Cross Nursing in America, has offered two Prizes, one of £20 and one of £10, for the best and the second best invention by a nurse, to be exhibited at San Francisco. We hope to publish the rules for this Competition at an early date, and also hope the inventive genius of British nurses will be spurred to compete and carry off at least one of these valuable prizes.
