ST. SAVIOUR'S INFIRMARY, SOUTHWARK.

WOMAN'S KINGDOM AT OLYMPIA.

THE NURSING SECTION.

Woman's Kingdom would be very incomplete without some display of Nursing Handicraft, for nursing has always been a domain in which woman reigns supreme.

On the invitation of the National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies, therefore, the National Council of Trained Nurses has organised an exhibit representing, so far as space will permit, different branches of nursing in the Nursing Section at Olympia from April 11th to 30th, and many willing hands have been at work to contribute to its perfection. The Exhibit is organised under the following Sections:—

THE HEAD.

THE ROYAL EAR HOSPITAL.

From the Royal Ear Hospital, Dean Street, Soho, W.C., comes an exhibit, organised by the Matron, Miss Macfarlane, including two dolls, showing two different mastoid dressings, one doll

with black silk out-of-door shield, one doll with sterilised mask for use after tonsil operation, for a patient returning home the same day. Also one sterilised Mastoid Packet containing small towel, $\frac{1}{2}$ in. iodoform gauze plug, cyanide and wool dressing, bandages and safety-pin, a card containing four different kinds of nasal plugs, a packet containing two kinds of swabs used in the theatre; three glass tubes containing sterilized $\frac{1}{2}$ in. iodoform gauze, 2 in. iodoform gauze, sterilised wool, throat mops on holders, sea sponges on holders.

THE CHEST.

THE ROYAL HOSPITAL FOR DISEASES OF THE CHEST, CITY ROAD, E.C.

Miss Rundle, the Matron, is demonstrating a system of record keeping in a tuberculosis dispensary, models of ventilation schemes, suitable for district work, and model cots showing the nursing position of patients suffering from tuberculosis, heart disease, and pneumonia, all of which come within the scope of a Chest Hospital.
