We visited the tomb of Bishop Gundulph, founder in 1078, of St. Bartholomew's Hospital, Rochester, saw the buff leather jerkins worn by Cromwell's soldiers, who played havoc with the Cathedral and which they used as a stable, admired the beautiful crypt and then hurried on to the Castle, where the walls of the ancient keep are twelve feet thick, and there are still remains of a Roman wall to be seen.
