generously with the large and indispensable body of trained nurses for which it is responsible.

In this connection we would urge all nursesespecially those intending to do private nursing or to emigrate, to gain experience in the nursing of infectious diseases. No nurse can consider herself thoroughly trained who has not practical experience in Fever Nursing.
