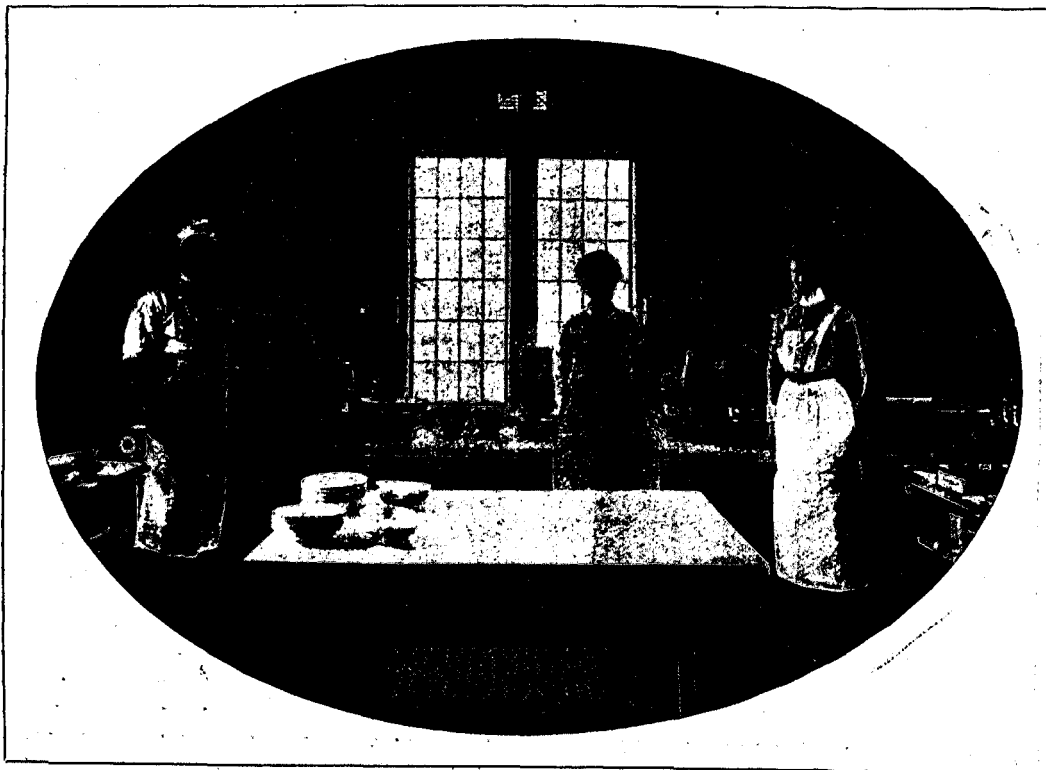
one of the perfectly equipped kitchens at the same hospital, where the cooking is done entirely by electricity.
