DEDICATION OF THE MILITARY SECTION.

Saturday, November 27th, was a Red Letter Day at the Royal Free Hospital, Gray's Inn Road, W.C., for the Bishop of the Diocese came to

dedicate its new Military Section and Chapel, and it would be difficult to find a more restful and beautiful hospital Chapel, with mortuary chapel adjoining, than the one dedicated by the Bishop on Saturday last.

The entrance to both chapels is by a vestibule where a Guard of Honour of Territorial Nurses was drawn up. On the right is the mortuary chapel, directly facing one the chapel proper. By the kindness of the Matron, Miss Cox-Davies, we are able to present an illustration of the latter, but this can convey no idea of the harmony of the colouring, the richness of the embroideries of frontal, and dossal, with wings tender blue in tone, and the beau-tiful east window, blending with the grey walls and red tiled floor.


