There are now nearly 500 Guy's Nurses working in military hospitals at home and abroad.

The deaths of two members of the League since the last meeting were recorded with regret—Miss Alice Wilcox, from heart and bronchial disease, and Miss Jessie Sarah Burn from acute bronchitis.

HON. TREASURER'S REPORT.

In the absence of Mrs. Cameron Miss Hogg also presented the Hon. Treasurer's Report. The income of the League for the year amounted to ± 353 IIS. IId. and the expenditure to ± 374 8s. 2d. The excess of expenditure over income was thus ± 20 if So. 3d., due to the cost of printing the new Edition of the Nursing Guide, which owing to the increase in the price of paper, labour and in the number of pages had amounted to ± 187 , part of which would be recovered from advertisers.

The Council were prepared for this expenditure, and a balance of £119 had been brought forward from last year to help to meet it. The subscriptions had again covered the working expenses of the League, and in spite of the publication of the *Nursing Guide* there was a balance of £98 16s. 10d. to carry forward.
