The Queen has signified her intention to be present at the Queen's Theatre on Thursday afternoon, December 20th, at a performance of Sir

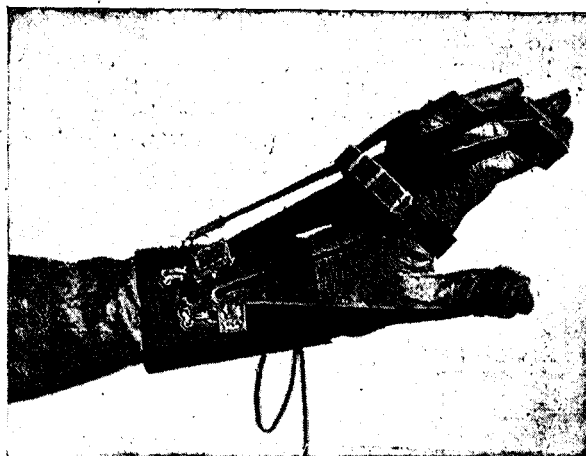

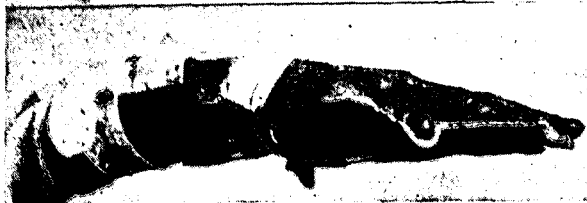
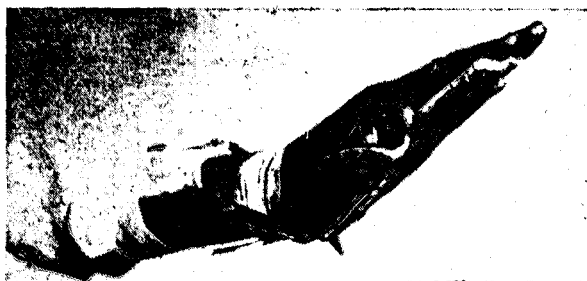
