Nation's Fund for Nurses has been registered by the Council under the War Charities Act, 1916.

There is therefore now no ambiguity about the Nation's Nurses. The British Women's Hospital Committee has placed them before the public *in forma pauperis* as a class of workers needing public charity, for their personal support, and this has cast a most unjustifiable slur on the professional status of the British trained nurse, thus degrading her in the body politic below the rank of domestic servants and any class of casual workers who by their work can keep off the rates.

This is the principle which the Society for the State Registration of Trained Nurses, and the Nurses Protection Committee are opposing in this charitable appeal, issued by Viscountess Cowdray and a Committee composed mainly of professional actresses.

The action of these ladies is an unwarrantable affront to the highly skilled professional women of whom the nursing profession is composed.
