antiseptic remedies, but one and all of them may be robbed of half, if not all, of their efficacy if the household sanitary precautions I have just dwelt upon are neglected or ignored, for aërial contamination may baffle them all, and the poisonous gas may attack the respiratory tract, and the pulmonary mucous membrane convey infection, as well as the genital tract. Hence it is I attached so much importance to those disinfectants (notably Condy's Fluid, that is really an aerial purifier), and still more must we rely upon that great purifier of all, the oxygen of the atmosphere as it reaches us in the fresh air, for without thorough ventilation-that is *constantly* changing the air of the bedroom-no scheme of disinfecting can be complete.
