CARE OF THE WOUNDED.

We are glad to note that the mobile Scottish Women's Hospital Unit which has recently returned from Russia is in process of re-equipment at the request of the War Office, and will, for the future, be known as the "Dr. Elsie Inglis Unit," will rejoin the Serbian Division, will go wherever destiny may direct, and will consist of about twenty-six members, the majority of whom belonged to the original unit.
