
OUR ROLL OF HONOUR.

MEMORIAL SERVICE.

Her Majesty Queen Alexandra will attend the Memorial Service for Nurses who have fallen in the war, to be held at St. Paul's Cathedral on April 10th at 2.30 p.m. If possible H.R.H. Princess Louise, H.R.H. Princess Beatrice, and H.R.H. Princess Arthur of Connaught will also be present. The sermon will be preached by the Venerable Archdeacon Holmes. The band of His Majesty's Coldstream Guards will play, under the direction of Major J. Mackenzie-Rogan, M.V.O., commencing at 1.50 p.m. Space will be reserved for nurses in uniform.

Nurses and V.A.D.'s serving in Territorial Hospitals should apply through their Principal Matrons to the Matron-in-Chief T.F.N.S., War Office, 80, Pall Mall, S.W.

Overseas Nurses to apply through their respective Matrons-in-Chief.

CARE OF THE WOUNDED.

The American Red Cross has given £250,000 to the British Red Cross "to alleviate as far as possible the suffering caused by the great battle."

It has also recognised the good work of the Scottish Women's Hospitals by making them a gift of £20,000. The gift is made at the instance of Miss Kathleen Burke.

The Ministry of National Service has issued appeal to members of the medical profession to come forward and offer voluntary service to cope with the large number of casualties at the Front. Most generous of "profesgenerous sionals " we have no doubt the medical profession will respond to the appeal; but when we realise the first-rate parttime services offered to our sick and wounded, which up to now have been ignored or refused by the War Office, it is little

wonder the need is acute. Because a medical man is sixty, that does not constitute him incapable of doing first-rate work, and War Office red tape, devoid of discrimination has lost most valuable aid for the Army ever since the beginning of the war. Let us hope some common sense will now prevail.

The world's greatest battle, now being waged in France, has taken terrible toll of life. We know little of our own heart-rending losses; but the slaughter of Germans has been colossal. So apprehensive are the Prussian War Lords of the consequences of the reckless offensive that wherever possible the long convoys of wounded have been posted to hospitals in Belgium in

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
