THE HOSPITAL WORLD.

The good work of the Infants' Hospital, Vincent Square, S.W., the only hospital in the Kingdom exclusively for infants, is always of interest. The restoration to health and physical soundness of suffering infants, to place the management of infants and the treatment of the disorders and diseases of nutrition occurring in infants upon a scientific basis, to organize lectures on all matters connected with infant feeding and management for nurses and health visitors and others interested in the study of infant life, and the training of nurses for infants, are all most important at any time, and doubly so at present, when the con-

servation of infant life is of prime importance to the nation. We regret, therefore, to note that the debt on the hospital was, last year, increased by £719 19s., making the total deficit £2,723 9s. 4d., the price of commodities and labour being the chief cause. The low cost of the washing, which is done on the premises, is always a surprise to us. Even allowing for the fact that many of the articles are small, the all-round cost of 8s. 11d. per thousand is surely a record.

The educational work done entails no charge. whatever upon the funds of the Hospital, but the income is augmented by the fees resulting there-

Mr. George Verity, at the annual meeting of Charing Cross Hospital, said that it was founded a century ago, and had never been in such a favourable position as it was to-day. The mortgage of £85,000 had been swept away. The builders' debt of over £20,000 and the closed wards and unequipped theatres were things of the past. The hospital was absolutely efficient, and, although unendowed, did not owe a penny. It was equipped on the latest scientific lines in every department. They showed the lowest cost per bed of any London hospital. Princess Louise, their president, had displayed great munificence in connection with the work. We congratulate all concerned.
