the nurse members is at once to tackle the Constitution, concerning which they have never been consulted and of which the majority know nothing, and have it reformed. As it stands its provisions are archaic, and as obsolete as the dodo. They were largely drafted thirteen years ago by Sir Cooper Perry and Miss Swift, of Guys, with the help of Sir Henry Burdett. We need say no more.
