At the beginning of the war 50 per cent. of our Irish Trained Nurses volunteered and went on active service, and, while absent, without their leave or consent, the College of Nursing, Ltd., London, started a branch of its organisation in this country and appealed to the charitable Irish public to subscribe liberally to a fund for the endowment of a Nursing College in London and a benevolent fund for Nurses. Now, we Irish Trained Nurses would like to be enlightened on the following points:—

- r. What proportion of this charity will go to endow the College of Nursing?
- 2. What proportion of the benevolent fund for Trained Nurses?
 - 3. What body will administer this fund?
- 4. What qualifications may entitle women to apply and get benefit from this proposed benevolent fund for Nurses?

The majority of our Irish Trained Nurses are self-respecting, hard-working women, and we do not want our calling to be made little of, especially at the present time, in Ireland, and what our Sisters are doing for suffering humanity has been done voluntarily, and I am pleased to be in a position to state that when invalided in Service the British Government have granted pensions and looked after them in a most generous manner. In conclusion, I hope the people who attended the meeting at The Royal Hospital, Kilmainham, on Tuesday, 21st inst., will get my questions answered before subscribing to this Fund, A Nation's Tribute to Nurses.

THE NEW POSTAGE RATES.

The Postmaster-General gives notice that the new postage rates will be applied to all 'articles posted after midnight of June 2nd-3rd. The rates affected are those for inland letters, postcards, book-packets, samples, and parcels, and for letters to British possessions generally and to the U.S. of America. Notices giving full particulars of the new rates will be issued to all post offices in the course of this week.

What Nurses must remember is to place stamps to the amount of three halfpence on *every* letter, and a penny stamp on *every* postcard. In inviting a reply from the *B.J.N.* please enclose stamps.

THE PAPER CRISIS.

NO "SALE OR RETURN."

To secure further economy in the use of paper the Board of Trade have made an Order prohibiting, on and after June 24th the delivery to retailers in the United Kingdom or in any other European country of newspapers, periodicals, books, post-cards, or similar publications on the terms known as "sale or return" or under any other arrangement by which any allowance is made for unsold copies. On and after December roth the Order is to apply to any dominion or country whatsoever.
