In a letter from the Médécin Chef of Ambulance 16/21 --now *en repos*—referring to the Sisters, he writes :----'' Allow me to take advantage of this circumstance to tell you what technical competency, devotion and spirit of sacrifice these ladies have shown in this formation. On their feet night and day, and their collaboration has been the means of saving a great number of wounded, the greater part being thoracic, abdominal, gangrene, gas and shell-shock.''

General Nollet, who knew them all, insisted on coming himself to

give them the recompense which was due to them (Croix de Guerre). We do not forget that it is to the French Flag Nursing Corps that we owe the advantage of this happy combination, and we thank it heartily on our behalf, and on behalf of the wounded."

We reproduce photographs of two cases attended by the Sisters of injuries caused by explosive bullets, treated by the Carrell method, which, owing to first-class surgery at an early date. "Let me tell you," writes the latter, "how much I have enjoyed my work in Frarce. It has been a wonderful experience, a beautiful revelation of all that is best in human nature. In the three years I have been at the Front I have never heard one unkind word, nor one word of complaint from either wounded or orderlies. No wonder we were able to work."
