Members will remember that the Honorary Diploma was conferred upon Miss Graham by Her Royal Highness Princess Christian, the President, and the Council of the Corporation, when she was in this country after doing splendid work in Egypt and also in England during the war. Miss Molly Coleman has forwarded to us a copy of *The* Australasian, in which there appears, among many other interesting pictures, one showing His Royal Highness talking to Miss Bennallack. The latter is well known to many members of the parent Association, as they saw much of her at the office from time to time while she was doing military nursing. It will be remembered that she preceded Miss Penrose as Secretary of the Branch Association.

We learn that the announcement in the Journal some months ago that Dr. Mayo, a member of the Council in Adelaide, had the honour of being presented to Her Royal Highness the President, has given much pleasure to our fellow-members on the Island Continent.
