tots first, some heads a ripple of golden curls, all intent on piling up their bags in orderly fashion. Only one strongly objected to parting with her treasure, but that also ultimately was

added to the heap.

Then came dancing. Little boys and girls revelling in the poetry of motion, and adding to the enjoyment of their elders by their own pleasure and symmetry. Each party as it eventually retired having added its pretty share to the general entertainment was warmly applauded by the members of the nursing staff, trim and spotless in their neat uniforms, and the visitors present.

After the departure of Her Royal Highness, the visitors dispersed, some to the tea tent where willing helpers were kept busy, others to make purchases in the tent which bore the legend, "Kent Produce," and yet others found their way to the hospital in Wood Street, where they saw, for themselves, the good work that is going on.

In the new hospital the wards, with balconies, will contain beds for 42 maternity patients, with labour wards, nurseries, sterilising apparatus, ward kitchens, and sanitary arrangements. Some of the wards will contain one bed-for cases such as phthisis, which might endanger the health of others, and for which provision is not, as a rule, made by maternity hospitals. There will also be an Ante-natal Department, with booking, examination, and waiting rooms, and dispensary. Provision will also be made for the stocking and sterilisation of district bags, and the housing of bicycles.

All ex-pupils who continue to practise mid-wifery will be welcomed back to post-graduate courses which, in the new hospital, will probably

be of yearly occurrence.

Up to Saturday last the Committee had only received sufficient to enable it to accept the contract for the ward block, but the gifts announced on that day have justified it in arranging that the second block shall also be proceeded with. It is to be hoped that the balance still required will soon be forthcoming.
