ment of its pre-war glories, and still so full of live shells as to be unsafe for a stranger to venture there alone; but the fury of the Hun had spent itself in vain, for still on the highest fragment of wall, from which we had a glorious view of the surrounding plain, floated the Tricolour of France.

Afterwards we went on to see the emplacement of the big Bertha which bombarded Soissons and Compiègne. Quiet, peaceful and indeed deserted now, it was hard to realise that not long since it was the centre of an *inferno*.

When we returned to headquarters we found Miss Clarke still serving out beans, and still the people streamed up the hillside for "les haricots," a picturesque group in the autumn sunlight. only a cinematograph artist had been there to take a film the donors would have been well satisfied to see the appreciation of their gift, though its use differed from their original intention.
