moral character, and that they are under 21 years of age.

ENGLAND.

Conditions of Admission to the General Part of the Register.

(a) A certificate that the applicant has had not less than three years' training before the 1st November, 1919, in a General Hospital approved by the Council for training having one or more resident medical officers, or in a Poor Law Infirmary approved by the Council for training which is recognised by the Minister of Health for the training of superintendent nurses;

Provided that a nurse who has been trained for not less than three years in such a General Hospital not having any resident medical officer, or in such a Poor Law Infirmary not recognised by the Minister of Health for the purposes aforesaid, may be admitted to the general part of the Register if she satisfies the Council that she has adequate knowledge and experience of the nursing of the sick; or

- (b) Evidence that the applicant has had not less than one year's training in a Hospital or Infirmary approved by the Council as aforesaid, together with evidence that she has subsequently been bona fide engaged in practice as a nurse in attendance on the sick for not less than two years before 1st November, 1919; or
- (c) A certificate that the applicant has had not less than two years' training in a General Hospital for Children approved by the Council, together with evidence of one year's subsequent training in a General Hospital or Poor Law Infirmary approved by the Council as aforesaid prior to the 1st November, 1919; or
- (d) A certificate that the applicant has had not less than two years' training in a Hospital for Infectious Diseases approved by the Council, together with evidence of one year's subsequent training in a General Hospital or Poor Law Infirmary approved by the Council as aforesaid prior to the 1st November, 1919; or
- (e) A certificate that the applicant has had not less than two years' training in a Hospital for Women approved by the Council, together with evidence of one year's subsequent training in a General Hospital or Poor Law Infirmary approved by the Council as aforesaid prior to the 1st November, 1919; or
- (f) Evidence that the applicant is a superintendent or head nurse appointed by the Ministry of Health prior to the 1st November, 1919.

FEES.

The Fee for Existing Nurses is £1 is. to the General Part of the Register, and 10s. 6d. for each additional Supplementary Register. The fee for retention on the Register is 2s. 6d. annually, to be paid before October 31st in each year.

Applications under these Rules must be made within a period of two years from the 14th July, 1921.

SCOTLAND.

CONDITIONS OF ADMISSION TO THE GENERAL PART OF THE REGISTER.

- (a) A certificate from the Local Government Board for Scotland or from the Scottish Board of Health that the applicant possesses the qualifications for the General part of the Register required by the Department so certifying; or
- (b) A certificate of not less than three years' training before the 1st November, 1919, from a general hospital or institution recognised by the Council for training for the purposes of the General part of the Register, and having one or more resident medical officers; or
- (c) Evidence that the applicant has been for three years before the 1st day of November, 1919, bona fide engaged in practice as a nurse in attendance on the sick, and for at least one of the said three years in a hospital or institution for the treatment of the sick recognised by the Council under this section; or
- (d) In the case of a nurse whose training has been obtained in a hospital or institution not recognised by the Council under this section, evidence that the applicant has been trained for at least one year in said hospital or institution and has been for two years subsequently before the 1st day of November, 1919, bona fide engaged in practice as a nurse in attendance on the sick, and such special evidence of adequate knowledge and experience as the Council may consider satisfactory in each individual case; or
- (e) A certificate of not less that two years' training in a hospital or institution for the treatment of the sick (except mental hospitals or institutions for mental defectives), recognised by the Council, and evidence of not less than one year's training in a general hospital or institution having one or more resident medical officers, recognised by the Council for training for the purposes of the General part of the Register, all such training before 1st November, 1919.

FEES.

The Fee for Existing Nurses is fit is, to the General part of the Register, and ios. 6d. for each additional Supplementary Register. The fee for retention on the Register is 2s. 6d. annually, such sum to be paid by the 31st of October in each year.

Applications under these Rules must be made within a period of two years from July 29th, 1919

IRELAND.

CONDITIONS OF ADMISSION TO THE GENERAL PART OF THE REGISTER.

Female applicants who satisfy the conditions prescribed (as to good character, age, and references), will be admitted to the General Part of the Register on production of satisfactory evidence of having, prior to November 1st, 1919:—

(a) Carried out not less than three years' ap proved training in a General Hospital or Poor-Law Infirmary; or
