In making the presentation, Major Rigg, O.B.E., Chairman of the Board, said: "We do not wish to say good-bye, but only to wish you God-speed and *au revoir*. Knowing your keen appreciation and knowledge of literature, we ask you to accept these volumes as a slight token of our good-will and of the esteem in which we hold you. The gift consisted of the complete works of George Eliot, bound in green morocco, and some very valuable works on the Napoleon era, bound in red roan, in a fumed oak stand, to which was affixed a silver plate on which the date and occasion were beautifully engraved. Miss Donaldson, during the past eighteen months, has become well known to our Society, and we wish to place on record our real appreciation of the courtesy, sympathy and service which she is ever ready to place at the disposal of any one who calls on her for help. We want Miss Donaldson to know that her splendid spirit of service has made a great difference to us in this neighbourhood, and we deeply regret she has to leave us. We also wish to say that the Temperance Hospital possesses Sisters and Nurses who work and act in the very manner that Miss Donaldson's example

act in the very manner that Miss Donaldson's example inspires them to do. The poor of Glasgow are gaining one who will prove a true friend." Miss Donaldson, in replying, said : "My association with your splendid society has taught me much. I pay honour to the spirit of self-sacrifice which the members extend one to the other. How much of the unrest and misery of our age would end if the spirit of co-operation and mutual trust which has existed between us could become general."
