EDITORIAL.

E are compelled, by the attitude of the authorities of the Royal Infirmary, Glasgow, to revert to the question of the present scandals at that Institution. As more than one of our correspondents have pointed out, there seems to be a desire on the part of the managers to imitate the tactics pursued under similar circumstances by the Committee of the London Hospital. But it is both foolish and impossible for the Glasgow managers to carry out this line of conduct-foolish, because it is futile; impossible, because the conditions are essentially diverse. It is futile to attempt to stifle grave grievances in a public Institution, as indeed the London Hospital case might have taught everyone who desired to do so. If the House Committee of that Institution had boldly announced that they were only trustees for a great Charity, and that, for their own credit's sake, they would have every allegation against their management sifted to the uttermost; if they had persuaded three men of known honour and standing to hold a public inquiry-had promised their employées protection if they told the truth, and dared their critics to prove their complaints before an impartial tribunal-public confidence and approval would have gone with them. They would, doubtless, easily have shown that they were ignorant of facts almost incredibly discreditable, and of practices equally questionable, which were done under the cover of their authority. In one month, a full inquiry could have been made, an equitable judgment delivered,
