increase in the number of women police, Miss Lord reported that the Home Secretary prefaced the proceedings by stating that it was his intention, at once, to appoint a Committee of Enquiry to investigate the question.

Letters were also received from the Registrar of the General Nursing Council for England and Wales acknowledging the protest sent by the Council at its last meeting against the action of that Council in empowering an outside body to nominate the Examiners in Mental Nursing for the State Examination.

The Hon. Secretary also reported Miss Sanderson's acceptance of the invitation to take part in a deputation

now being arranged.

The Council had the pleasure of hearing from Miss Alice Reeves, Matron of Dr. Steevens' Hospital, Dublin, who was present, of her acceptance of office as a Vice-President of the Council, and her appreciation of the honour done her.

Thirty-four letters were received expressing the regret of members at their inability to be present.

William J. Morton, who has held that position since before the foundation stone was laid by the late Princess Christian on May 13th, 1902. A dainty tea was served at small tables decorated with lovely flowers. All the delicious cakes were made on the premises. The cook has held that position since the hospital first opened, and, with the staff under her, cooks daily for over 200 people.

After a final walk in the lovely grounds the members of the Council reluctantly bid adieu to their kind hostess, and returned to town mentally and physically refreshed.

Town, and members of a party of nurses—whom she' has conducted from South Africa, to visit the British Empire Exhibition, and make a foreign tour—at the Headquarters of the International and National Councils of Nurses, at 43^I, Oxford Street, London, W. on May 17th.
