LEAGUE OF RED CROSS SOCIETIES.

At the Session of the General Council of the Red Cross Societies recently held in Paris, the question of the development of the international course in public health nursing at the Bedford College for Women, London, which had attracted nurses from Red Cross Societies in thirty-four countries was discussed. Mlle. Masarykova, on behalf of the Czecho-Slovak Red Cross Society, promised a grant of 50,000 francs (about £800 at present rates) towards the establishment of a home for nurses who attend this course. Mr. J. B. Payne, for the American Red Cross Society, promised a grant of 500,000 francs (£8,000) for the same purpose, and the British delegate stated that his Society would also contribute.

It is proposed to build a Hostel in London for the comfort of all international nursing students, approved by the League of Red Cross Societies.

AN INTERNATIONAL COURSE IN TRAINING SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION. The League of Red Cross Societies, in view of the demand

for specially prepared nurses to fill positions as Matrons or Directrices of Schools for Nurses, and to act as Teachers and Sister-Tutors in Nursing, has decided to establish a new International Course in London, in addition to the International Course of Training for Public Health Nursing, and a course in Training School Administration will be opened at Bedford College for Women, in conjunction with the College of Nursing, Ltd., on September 1st next. A Joint Advisory Committee has been formed with Miss M. J. Tuke, M.A., Principal of Bedford College as Chairman, on which the Matrons of five of the large London Hospitals, the General Infirmary, Leeds, and the Radcliffe Hospital, Oxford, have seats. Among the educational members of the Committee is Mrs. Williams, B.A., Manchester University, Lecturer in Economics at Bedford College.

As students are expected from different countries, where practice and customs differ, it has been decided that each student will be given an individual course, based upon

previous education, professional training and experience.

The work of all students will include:—Principles of Hospital Administration, Nursing School Administration, Educational Psychology and Methods of Teaching, the History of Nursing, Principles of Institutional Care and Practical Work.

Only nurses graduated from courses of at least two years' training will be considered.

Preference will be given those who are already appointed to executive or teaching positions in schools.
