NATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN.

The Annual Meeting and Conference of the National Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland will be held in the Dome and Royal Pavilion, Brighton, from October 6th to roth. The special subject for the Conference is "The Call to the Younger Generation," and on Monday, October 6th, at 8 p.m., there will be a meeting for Girls in the Dome, at which the Chairman will be the Viscountess Astor, M.P., when Miss C. T. Cumberbirch, B.A., Principal of the Municipal Training College, Hull, will speak on "Openings for Social Service Boil of The Municipal Service Boil of The Mu Openings for Social Service, Paid and Unpaid," and Mrs. George Morgan, President of the National Council of Women, will speak on "The Spirit Behind Work."

On Tuesday, October 7th, the Representative Council Meeting will be held in the Dome, when the President will

be in the Chair. Addresses of welcome will be given by the Mayors of Brighton and Hove, and by Lady Cowan, President of the Brighton and Hove Branch. Mrs. George Morgan will then give the Presidential Address, the Annual Report, Statement of Accounts, and Hon. Editor's Report will be presented by the respective officials, and amendments to the Constitution will be considered. Under this heading it will be proposed by the Countess of Selborne, on behalf of the Executive:

That women Members of Parliament shall, during their tenure of office, be eligible for election as Hon. Members of the Executive, with power to vote; these members to be elected in addition to the twelve ordinary members.

The Representative Council Meeting will be continued in the afternoon, when the Resolutions on the Agenda will be taken.

At 4.45 there will be a Reception by the Local Conference Committee to the Executive Committee and Branch Secretaries in the Royal Pavilion, and at 8 o'clock a public meeting, when the subject will be "The Call from Home," "Home Makers," "Good Housing," and "Homes Over-

The programme for Wednesday, October 8th, is:—9.30 a.m., Devotional Meeting in the Royal Pavilion; 10 a.m. to I p.m., continuation of Representative Council Meeting.

The election by ballot of the Executive Committee will take place in the Ballot Room from 9.30 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. In the afternoon there will be visits to local Educational and Health Institutions, and at 5.15 a Conference of Women Justices of the Peace, open to representatives only, "To discuss whether preventive detention of men guilty of more than one offence would be a suitable remedy for child

assault," when Mrs. Edwin Gray, J.P., will preside.
At 8 p.m., there will be a Public Meeting; subject,
"The Call from the Nation," when Lady Cowan will preside.
Mr. Frank Briant, M.P., will speak on "Citizenship," and Mrs. George Cadbury, M.A., O.B.E., on "The Re-

sponsibility of the Individual."

On Thursday, October 9th, the Representative Council will meet again, and in the afternoon will consider Resolutions adopted in Copenhagen, to be placed upon the agenda for the meeting of the International Council of Women in 1925, when Mrs. Ogilvie Gordon, D.Sc., Ph.D., F.L.S., J.P., will open the discussion.

At 8 p.m. there will be a Reception by invitation by the Mayors of Brighton and Hove in the Royal Pavilion.

On Friday, the Rev. R. J. Campbell, D.D., will be the preacher at the special service in Holy Trinity Church, after which there will be excursions to places of interest in and around Brighton, and the Conference will conclude with a Public Meeting on "The Call from the World," when the Chair will be taken by the Lady Frances Balfour, LL.D., D.Litt., and the Viscount Cecil of Chelwood will speak on "The Work of the League of Nations."
