Lyngen Fjord in Northern Norway is one of the most superb colour vistas imaginable with its blue glaciers descending into purple shadowed gorges, mirrored in water clear as glass underneath the golden hue of the Midnight Sun. Finally, to watch from the North Cape, the "edge of the world," the phenomenon of the Midnight Sun and to see "Without one interval of darkness, the Past transfer itself into the Present and Yesterday become To-day," is an unparalleled experience.
