### **NURSES' ORGANISATIONS.**

#### THE MATRONS' COUNCIL OF GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

A most enjoyable and interesting afternoon was spent by members of the Matrons' Council on Saturday, May 29th, at the Epileptic Colony, Chalfont St. Peter, by the kind invitation of the Matron, Miss Parry, and the Committee.

The members went down by train and were met by motor at Gerrards Cross Station, the drive to the Colony through the leafy lanes of Bucks, now at their best, was very much appreciated. On arrival members visited various parts of the Colony, which stands in over 400 acres, under the guidance of the Matron and Sisters. One of the most attractive parts was the exhibition of work, very beautiful and of various kinds, done by the patients, and of which several members made purchases; the Parade of the Colony Boy Scouts proved another attraction.

After the tour a very dainty tea was served and much appreciated, and at 5.30 p.m. the members adjourned for the business meeting which was held in the new Board Room, Miss Parry saying she had to wait until it was built before she could ask the Council down; it was certainly

worth waiting for.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed. The President then rose and said she was sure the Meeting would wish to convey to the relatives of the late Miss Forrest, and the late Miss Marsters our deep sympathy with them in their loss, this was passed by a standing vote

A letter was then read from the National Council of Women regarding their Annual Conference to be held in London in October. Miss Helen Pearse, Miss Kathleen Smith, Miss Carson Rae, consented to act as the three delegates of the Council; Miss Villiers consented to have her name forwarded for re-election to the Executive Committee, and a small sub-committee was formed to consider the Resolutions which will be sent by the N.C.W. for selection for this Agenda about July.

Miss Helen Pearse consented to attend a Conference on June 22nd, convened by the N.U.S.E.C., on the Smoke Abatement Bill, and the Secretary was instructed to ask

The President was then asked to give the members any information she could regarding the British College of

Miss Pearse said she considered it a magnificent thing that this should have come. Registration was only the beginning and would make it possible to raise the Profession to where it should be, which could not have happened without this gift, through lack of funds. Miss Pearse pointed out the difference between the British College of Nurses and the College of Nursing, Ltd., and compared the Constitution of both bodies.
