THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

H.R.H. The Princess Arthur was graciously pleased to preside at the Annual Meeting of the Association which was held at 194, Queen's Gate on Thursday, June 24th. Her Royal Highness was received on her arrival by the Hon. Officers (Miss Alice Cattell and Mr. H. J. Paterson), Mrs. Bedford Fenwick, Miss Isabel Macdonald (Secretary), and others, and was presented with a lovely bouquet of pink and mauve carnations, tied with silver ribbon, by Miss Cattell.

A resolution was put from the Chair to give expression to the respect which the Members present felt for a Colleague who recently passed away—Miss Maude MacCallum—and to convey a message of sympathy to Mr. John MacCallum. Mrs. Bedford Fenwick was requested to say a few words to the Members, as she knew more intimately than anyone present, what Miss MacCallum's work for the Profession had been. Mrs. Fenwick referred to the death of Maude MacCallum as a great tragedy, and said how she had devoted the latter years of her life to the benefit of her fellow nurses, to helping them to attain professional freedom and to all her generous work for it while suffering from a malignant disease; also to the courage with which she laboured on and would not permit her friends to be harassed by the knowledge of her suffering until she was practically on the point of death. She had, said Mrs. Fenwick, given to us all a great and splendid lesson; not only by the work she had accomplished, but by the extreme courage which sustained her through a long and terrible illness—a courage that had never failed. The Resolution of sympathy was carried by a silent upstanding vote.

The Report of the Executive Committee dealt with the activities of the Association during 1925, most of which have been fully reported, as they occurred, in our official organ. We need not therefore absorb valuable space by recapitulation. Mrs. Lambert, in seconding the Report, said that it gave evidence of much work on the part of the Executive Committee. On behalf of the Members, she offered warm thanks to the Committee.

The Financial Reports showed that, on the General Fund, there was an excess of income over expenditure amounting to £21 16s. 4d. In the accounts of the Settlement Fund, also, there was cause for satisfaction as the income had exceeded the expenditure, but the Helena Benevolent Fund had expended some £14 more than it had received. The Hon. Treasurer referred to the great assistance which the House Beautiful Fund had given in redecorating the Club and in supplying it with new chintzes, flowers, &c. In seconding the adoption of the Report, Mrs. Bedford Fenwick said that it was satisfactory to note that the Association was solvent, but, what pleased her more than that, was the note struck in every one of the accounts before the Meeting, the evidence in each one of them that the Members rose to the needs of their Association and contributed themselves what was required to maintain it and to enable it to carry on its work. She admired them for their spirit

of independence, and thanked them for their generosity to their Association.
