## PRESENTATION OF LONG SERVICE BADGES BY HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN TO SUPER-INTENDENTS AND NURSES OF O.V.J.I.

On July 14th the Queen visited the Headquarters of Queen Victoria's Jubilee Institute for Nurses, and honoured a number of Superintendents and Nurses by presenting to them Long Service Badges.

Her Majesty was received in the entrance hall by the Duke of Portland (President of the Queen's Fund) and Sir Harold Boulton (Chairman of the Council). A Guard of Honour of Queen's Nurses was drawn up and Her Majesty was presented with a bunch of pale pink roses, tied with the Jubilee ribbon, by Miss Worrall who was chosen by ballot for this honour.

The Honorary Officers were then presented to Her Majesty by Sir Harold Boulton together with Miss

Peterkin (General Superintendent), Miss Lowe (Secretary), and other members of the Council and officials of the Institute.

The Duke of Portland welcomed the Queen on behalf of the Council. The Queen, before leaving, made a tour of the offices, enquiring into the details of the organisation of the Central Office itself, as well as of the work of the Queen's Nurses in their varied activities throughout the country.

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
