# GENERAL NURSING COUNCIL FOR ENGLAND AND WALES.

#### POINTS TO NOTE AND REMEMBER.

PUBLICITY THE BEST POLICY.

At the meeting on July 16th of the General Nursing Council for England and Wales, the question of the number of the permanent staff required, the designation of each, and the salaries to be paid were taken in camera, the recommendations of the General Purposes Committee being: (1) "That the permanent staff and Salary Sheet (appended) be submitted to the Minister of Health for approval"; and (2) "That in the event of the approval of suggested scale by the Minister of Health, the recommendation for adjustment

of salaries now submitted be approved.'

Why this secrecy? In the past the amount of salary paid to each official was plainly stated at the Council meeting, as it should be, and the emoluments of the higher officials were on a sufficiently generous scale. It must not be forgotten that Registered Nurses pay the entire cost of maintaining the Nurses' Registration Acts for the public benefit as well as their own. Not one penny is derived from the Treasury. The Registered Nurses have a right therefore to know what salaries are being paid to their officials, and how the £30,000 a year they are called upon to find is being expended by the General Nursing Council.

Mr. R. W. Donaldson is Chairman of the Finance Committee, and the sooner he reverts to the system in practice in the past of reporting what each official costs in salary, &c., the better. We call for a clear statement in this connection. If the suggested salaries are just there is no reason for taking them in camera. We hope the Minister of Health will discourage secrecy concerning the Council's finance. Its huge expenditure in our opinion requires drastic reduction.

# NURSES' ORGANISATIONS.

## THE INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL OF NURSES.

There has been forwarded this week to the Headquarters of the International Council of Nurses, I, Place du Lac, Geneva, the most interesting file of professional Journals which, by the kindness of Mrs. Bedford Fenwick, and the Registered Nurses' Society (a constituent society of the National Council of Nurses of Great Britain), has been accommodated and cared for at 431, Oxford Street, London. By the foresight of the Founder and Foundation Members, these volumes, many of which are now unobtainable, They include form the nucleus of a very valuable library. the whole file from 1888 to the present time of the Nursing Record, now the British Journal of Nursing, which have been bound each year, and presented by the late Miss M. N. Cureton, bound volumes of the American Journal of Nursing (1900-1913), presented by Miss L. L. Dock, who also presented an inscribed copy of the four volumes of "A History of Nursing," and other interesting books, the German edition of the two first volumes of "A History of Nursing," 10 volumes of the Canadian Nurse, 13 volumes of Nosohomos, the three first volumes of Epione, six volumes of Untern Lazarus Kreuz, seven volumes of Tidsskrift, two volumes of La Garde Malade Hospitalière, four volumes of Kai Tiaki, seven volumes of Una, bound copies of the Transactions and Reports of the International Council of Nurses, and other interesting books and pamphlets.
