THE JOHN HOWARD HOMES FOR NURSES, BRIGHTON.

A most charming and thoughtful provision for retired nurses in the evening time of life, was made by the late Mr. John Howard, a well-known resident in Brighton, when he gave thought and care to the needs of twenty-four



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trained nurses in their declining years, and built the cottage homes which bear his name, and arranged for their endowment.

The Homes, which are built on three sides of a green quadrangle, are excellently designed. They form a feature in the landscape just after leaving Blackrock on the road to Rottingdean. Most of the cottages contain self-contained flats—sitting-room, bedroom, kitchen, bathroom and lavatory. The more substantial part of the furniture is

provided, but there is plenty of space for the individual possessions of the resident.

One of the Fellows of the British College of Nurses — Miss St. Clair Davies—has been fortunate in being allotted one of the flats, and in the picture which we are permitted to publish she is seen in possession, surrounded by her treasures, many of which have been acquired in her travels in many countries in the course of her nursing career. Now she has greater time for their enjoyment.

We feel sure that if the kind Donor could see (perhaps he does) the happiness and pleasure of the nurses in the Homes he has provided he would be well content with the result of his generosity.
