THE INTERIM CONFERENCE.

Introduction.

Geneva, lake of many moods, but beautiful in them all, lay smiling, sunlit, colourful, when in the last week of July nurses of thirty-four nations converged upon the city from which it takes its name, to attend the Interim Conference convened by the International Council of Nurses, and so remained during the whole of their stay.

The official purpose of the gathering was the meeting of the Board of Directors of the I.C.N., convened to transact important business which had arisen since the meeting of the Grand Council in Helsingfors in 1925; but the opportunity was taken to hold an Interim Conference during the same week, and was eagerly seized by over seven hundred nurses, the largest contingents being those from Great Britain and France.



As the meetings of the Board of Directors were in session twice daily during the first part of the week, and the opening session of the Conference took place on the Wednesday evening, ordinary members of the Conference were able to settle down into their respective quarters, to visit places of interest, and to see something of the Nursing Exhibit at the Salle Centrale, opportunities of which they fully availed themselves.
