A FEW IMPRESSIONS OF THE INTERIM CON-FERENCE OF I.C.N., GENEVA, 1927.

To the Editor of The British Journal of Nursing.

DEAR MADAM, — From a mountain-top eyrie, the impressions of the recent strenuous week of sessions and social functions take a more concrete form.

One definite impression that is outstanding is one of thanks and respect due to the vision and brain that conceived and brought into being the International Council of Nurses, without which we undoubtedly would not have had the delightful and stimulating week of intercourse with our fellow nurses from all parts of the world, for if we are honest with ourselves we have to admit that many of us who so much enjoyed the Conference were not only apathetic to the Nurses' International movement but actively opposed to it.

This being only an interim conference, and not one with the Grand Council in session, there were fewer of the more advanced topics concerning nursing and nurses discussed; but the whole atmosphere was one of stimulus, particularly to the younger nurses who had turned out in such large numbers, and whom one was so pleased to see there and who added so much to the interest and stimulation by taking active and useful part in the discussions.

We are deeply indebted to the city of Geneva and various institutions for the interest taken in us and the hospitality extended to us, which was wonderful, and which culminated on Sunday in a reception by Dr. Rollier at Leysin, who entertained us so royally, lectured to us and showed us over parts of his wonderful and intensely interesting Clinic. It was a truly glorious day packed almost too full with interest and enjoyment. To get to Leysin we started at 7 a.m. and motored along the French side of Lac Leman, crossed the Rhone Valley and up the gorgeous "Route de Montaigne," then back along the Swiss side of the lake, a drive none will ever forget. Mont Blanc even showed his sympathy with us by coming from behind his curtain of mist and showing himself in all his glorious splendour.

When one thinks of the number of people of all nationalities and the mass of detail that had to be dealt with in Geneva, one's chief thought and impression is of thanks for the enormous stimulus and interest the Conference has been to all who were present, and who, I feel sure, are now warmly in sympathy with its uplifting ideals.
