A letter was read from a Fellow expressing her sincere gratitude to the Council for help after a serious accident. This nurse was knocked down by a motor cyclist, and sustained injury and concussion. As there were no witnesses she had no legal redress, but her case having been privately reported by the Treasurer to a Director of the Society in which the cyclist was insured, the Board generously awarded her £25, although not compelled legally to do so. This case is proof of how necessary it is in these days of dangerous traffic for nurses to be insured against accidents, and also of the benefit of belonging to an organisation which can help them in time of need.
