THE INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS ON TUBERCULOSIS AT ROME.

Everything is now well under way for the journey of the party of Members of the National Council of Nurses of Great Britain who are leaving this country for the International Congress on Tuberculosis at Rome. The party will leave Victoria Station on Thursday, September 20th, by the II o'clock train from the Continental platform and hope to arrive at Rome at 7 a.m. on Saturday, Septem-ber 22nd. The arrangements throughout are in the hands of Messrs. Thomas Cook and Son, Ltd., at their offices in Upper Berkeley St., and Miss E. Bright Robinson, a member of the party who speaks fluent French, will act as its conductor on the outward journey and will be pleased to give any assistance in her power to its members.

Two dominant personalities in Rome, of world-wide. eminence, members of the National Council of Nurses of Great Britain will wish, if possible, to see during their visit to Rome-His Excellency, Signor Mussolini, Chief of the Government, who is Hon. President of the Congress, and there is, therefore, every ground for hope that their wish may be gratified; and His Holiness, Pope Pius XI., with whom it is hoped that an Audience may be granted for some of their number.

From Mile. Negri di Lamporo, Via Toscano 12, Rome 24, we have received a copy of the Programme for the Inter-national Reunion of Nurses taking place at Rome in connection with the Sixth Congress.
