NURSES' ORGANISATIONS.

THE INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL OF NURSES.

Nurses who are planning to attend the Congress of the International Council of Nurses, which is being held in Montreal, July 8th-13th, 1929, are requested to send their applications for accommodation at an early date to the Committee on Arrangements, Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal.

Rooms have been secured in hotels, convents and boarding-houses at rates varying from \$1.00 to \$5.00 per day. The rates for rooms in the large hotels are as follows:—

Rates for bed and breakfast in convents are from \$1.25-\$1.50.

Rates in boarding-houses vary according to location and accommodation offered.

On arrival in Montreal, visitors who have not already received room assignment are requested to report to Headquarters—The Montreal High School, University Street—in order to obtain it.

The Finance Committee, which is a sub-committee of the Arrangements Committee for the Congress, has been working very hard indeed in order to collect funds to provide hospitality for nurses coming to the Congress from foreign countries. They will soon be sending invitations to the national organisations offering to their members as many free places as they are able to allocate to each country.

THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF NURSES OF GREAT BRITAIN.

As we go to press an important Conjoint Meeting of the Executive Committee and the Montreal Congress Sub-Committee is being held in the Board Room of the Registered Nurses Association, 39, Portland Place, to receive the draft programme for the International Congress of Nurses to be held in Montreal in 1929.

Considerable progress was reported with reference to the resolution passed at the last meeting, asking members to circularise their local Member of Parliament urging legislation on the lines suggested by the Departmental Committee in their report on the "1922 Act." After the business meeting the members adjourned to the nurses' sitting room where a most delightful tea was served by the sisters. Here the members were welcomed by the Chairman of the Committee, the Medical Officer of Health and the Resident Medical Officer.

A tour of the wards, laundry, kitchens and sanatorium

The beautiful grounds and the homely atmosphere pre-vailing all added to what was felt was a very successful

meeting. Members were present from Staffordshire, Leicestershire, Sheffield and included a party from London, and the interchange of ideas is found most helpful.

The next meeting will be held in London at 194, Queens Gate, S.W.7, during the month of January, 1929.
