THE PASSING BELL.

We regret to announce the sudden death of Mrs. Belcher, R.R.C., *née* German, late Sister, Queen Alexandra's Imperial Military Nursing Service, at Stafford, on November 23rd.

Mrs. Belcher trained at the Leicester Infirmary, 1902 to 1906, and was appointed to Q.A.I.M.N.S., in 1906, serving at Gosport, Devonport, and in Egypt for five years, returning to England in February, 1914.

On the outbreak of war she mobilised with No. 3 General Hospital, which was one of the first to proceed to France. In July, 1915, she was transferred to Egypt as Acting Matron. Her marriage took place in 1917 to an officer in the Mysore Lancers. This, however, did not curtail her nursing activities, and she continued to serve with Q.A.I.M.N.S. until peace conditions obtained, only resigning on her return to England in May, 1919. Deep sympathy will be felt for her relatives in their bereavement.

We greatly regret to record the death of Miss L. W. I. Stott, R.N., F.B.C.N., after months of ill health. Miss Stott was for many years Matron of the Wellington Hospital, New Zealand.
